

M. E. S. INDIAN SCHOOL PROCEDURE FOR BEHAVIOUR / DISCIPLINE INTERVENTON

1. Purpose

To improve discipline in students and to develop positive behaviour among students.

2. Scope

This is applicable to students for their behaviour development / discipline improvement and to enable them to face future challenges with confidence.

3. Responsibility

- Principal
- HOSs / HMs
- Counsellors
- Class teacher
- Discipline In-charge
- Parents

4. Procedure

1. Behaviour Intervention

It is important to have a behaviour intervention plan for the school in order to maintain and encourage appropriate behaviour

The discipline issues can be classified into different categories as follows:

MINOR/Level 1

 Incomplete homework/class work Pushing and/or running in corridors Late coming/tardiness Inappropriate uniform 	 Talking in class Non-compliance to school rules Inappropriate assembly behaviour Eating in corridors Not moving in line
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MIDDLE/Level 2

Inappropriate languageInappropriate use of electronic equipmentLying	 Use of cell phones Teasing Disrespecting teachers and school property

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MAJOR/Level 3

- Fighting
- Inappropriate representation of school
- Inappropriate use of emergency equipment
- Bunking class
- Cheating on exams
- Racism & other forms of discrimination
- Defacing school property
 - Theft
 - Defiance
 - Inappropriate use of internet/print material
 - Verbal aggression (uttering threats)
 - Physical aggression
 - Vandalism
 - Bullying

2. Interventions

These behaviour are handled initially by the teacher but are referred to the DISCIPLINE IN-CHARGE if incidents repeat.

Minor & Middle

Behaviour	Actions
 Defacing school property Excessive talking Failure to complete assigned work Inappropriate behaviour during assemblies/school activities Inappropriate hallway behaviour Inappropriate internet sites and/or print material Inappropriate language Inappropriate use of personal equipment Late coming Lying Non-compliance to school rules Pushing in corridors & staircase Teasing and/or derogatory remarks Use of electronic devices 	Verbal reminder to the student of the expected appropriate behaviour. Step 2: Verbal reminder to the student of the expected appropriate behaviour. Consequence applied by teacher. Calm down corner in each class for junior classes. Step 3: Verbal reminder to the student of the expected, appropriate behaviour. Inform parents by the teacher. Note: If there is no improvement in the behaviour the student will be referred to the counsellor for further intervention



3. <u>Major:</u> These behaviours are immediately referred to the discipline incharge/Counsellor and then to the Principal

Behaviour	Actions
 Bullying Defiance Endangerment of Self/Others Fighting Inappropriate representation of school Non-Emergency Fire Alarm Theft Vandalism Verbal Aggression 	Step 1: • Referral to Discipline incharge /Counsellor Step 2: • Home contact Step 3: • Meeting with parents. Step 4: • DETENTION if required Step 5: • Written apology to offended parties before the student is permitted to the class

Strategies for detention

Day 1- Day with counsellor where the counsellor will do the intervention

Day 2- Day with class teacher where the student will stay with the teacher during PT period and recess

Refer the child for additional support (external agencies).

Promote peer education by selecting and training students from each class to intervene or report the cases (Buddy Group)

Re-entry Meeting: A meeting will be held upon re-entry of the student after the suspension period is over with the Principal, Head of Section, Counsellor and Class Teacher concerned in order to understand the attitude/behaviour change of the student. Class teacher will monitor the performance of the student for 2 weeks and submit a report with the student's progress in behaviour to the Principal through the Head of Section.
