
2. Educational Objectives

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5. Curriculum & Educational Resources

The school is affiliated to the Central Board of Secondary Education, Delhi and follows CBSE curriculum.

COURSE CONTENT

PRE-PRIMARY CLASSES (KINDERGARTEN - I & II)

English, Mathematics, General Knowledge, Conversation/ EVS/ Science, Art & Craft, P.T., Swimming, Computer Science, Music, Dance, yoga, DEAR period, I Love Qatar (Qatar History).

JUNIOR CLASSES (I TO IV)

English, Modern Mathematics, E.V.S./ Science & Social, Qatar History, Art & Craft, Music, Dance, Physical Education, General Knowledge, DEAR period. Computer Science is included as graded subject in classes I to IV.

Second Language - (Hindi/Malayalam/French/Arabic/Urdu/Tamil)
Third Language - (Hindi/Malayalam/French/Arabic/Urdu/Tamil)

Class II – IV)

Those who opt for French/ Malayalam/ Urdu/ Arabic/ Tamil as second language shall learn Hindi as third language. However, Hindi will be taught either as second or third language.

This subject will be offered only if sufficient number of students opt.

MIDDLE SCHOOL CLASSES (V TO VIII)

English, Modern Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Qatar History, Physical Education, Art Education, Work Education, General Knowledge, and Artificial intelligence.

Second Language - (Hindi/Malayalam/French/Arabic/Urdu/Tamil)
Third Language - (Arabic/ Malayalam/ Urdu/ Tamil/ Telugu/

(Class V - VIII) Kannada/Marathi/French/Hindi)

Those who opt French/ Malayalam/Tamil/Arabic/Urdu as second language shall learn Hindi as third language. However, Hindi will be taught either as second or third language to students of Indian nationality.

Note:

- ✓ French/Arabic/Urdu/Tamil/Hindi/Malayalam are taught as second languages in classes I to X.
- ✓ For other nationalities, Hindi is not compulsory either as Second or Third language.
- ✓ Qatar History, Islamic Studies/Moral Education is compulsory in classes KG to VIII.

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SECONDARY CLASSES (IX & X)

English Language & Literature, Mathematics, Science, Social Science, Qatar History. Value education, Health Education and Physical Education, Art Education and Work Education will be the subjects for internal assessment.

Second Language - (Hindi/French/Malayalam/Arabic/ Urdu/Tamil) Introduction of Artificial Intelligence for IX.

General Studies, Physical & Health Education and Work Education will be the subjects for Internal Assessment.

Note:

- 1. Psychology/ Fashion Studies/ Applied Mathematics / Arts/ Humanities stream will be introduced for class XI, if sufficient number of students opt for the same.
- 2. The scheme of subjects may be changed as required/advised by the Central Board of Secondary Education, Delhi.
- 3. Change of optional subjects in class XI after the First Term will not be entertained. No such change in class XII.
- 4. Topics/paragraphs/references/quotations/diagrams that are against the principles of Islam and the laws of the host country, if found in the textual material, will be deleted.

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6. Curricular & Extracurricular activities

- Qur'an and Islamic classes for Muslim Boys' and girls' will be conducted separately from 8.30 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. on Saturdays by specially trained teachers on the basis of prescribed syllabi. School transport will be provided for students in Doha and Wakrah area. Qur'an and Islamic Classes will be conducted during winter/summer vacation as well.
- Co-curricular activities such as games, sports, music (classical/vocal/instrumental), dance, orchestra, gymnastics, dramatics, debate, public speaking, photography etc., are promoted. Individual and group competitions in these are conducted to bring about all-round development of the pupil. Special coaching classes are conducted for athletics and various games like Basketball, Football, Table Tennis, Volleyball, Cricket, Shuttle Badminton, Tennis, Throw ball, Taekwondo and Karate.
- Mass P.T. exercises are carried out on Thursdays.
- Students are annually taken out on picnics and educational tours. Teachers make adequate arrangements for such outings and supervise the conduct of the students. However, the Management of the school is not responsible for any unforeseen incidents like accidents or sickness during or after picnic, tours etc.
- **Houses**: Students of classes I to XII have been divided into four houses Red, Blue, Green and Yellow. Co-curricular activities are conducted house wise to develop a healthy spirit of competition among the students.
- Participation in curricular and co-curricular activities helps the pupil in building up his/her personality. It provides a sense of responsibility and capacity for leadership. It inculcates a sense of discipline in him/her. With this aim in view, Head Boy/Girl, House Captains/ Literary Association Secretaries, Student Editors, Prefects and Students Council members are elected to develop leadership qualities.
- Extra classes will be arranged for slow learners after class hours. Those from classes IX to XII, who are listed as slow learners, shall compulsorily attend these classes. Special class will be arranged for the students of classes IX to XII during holidays/winter vacation. Attendance of all students is compulsory in such classes.
- Intensive coaching classes will be arranged for the bright students. Students of classes IX to XII will not be granted leave except in emergency cases for more than one week. Students, who are found absent for more than a week without written permission from the Principal/Head of Section, may not be permitted to attend classes.

7. Building a sense of national pride & citizenship

8. The Three Compulsory Subjects

As per Ministry of Education and Higher Education (MoEHE) Guidelines, the three compulsory subjects i.e. Qatar History, Islamic Studies and Arabic (as language) are practiced in the school time table. Teachers take utmost care to teach the syllabi as proposed by MoEHE for the three compulsory subjects.

9. Quality of Teaching and Learning

- CBSE norms are closely followed while appointing teachers. Qualified and experience teachers having adequate subject comprise of our teaching faculty. The teaching skills are further enhanced by regular in-house training, in-service orientation programmes and orientation by professional experts. Besides classroom observation by HODs/HOS/ HAI/Principal, students' feedback is also taken into consideration to ensure the quality teaching.
- Weekly lesson plans are prepared in advance by a panel of teachers with the help of department heads. Also, a well-planned term wise curricular activities schedule is prepared every academic year. This system ensures that the curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are organized for an effective overall growth of the children.
- Teaching involves variety of approaches that is use of self, modern teaching methods including e-learning content, group learning, buddy system, educational games, quiz, club activity, worksheets/assignments to integrate and consolidate the concept and to make learning an enjoyable experience. Teachers ensures teaching instruction and notes meets heterogeneous group of learners.
- In order to promote better learning results, conducive visual learning is promoted amongst students. All classrooms are well equipped with interactive board, white board and ICT facilities to assist e-learning. Use of power point presentation for additional reference is also practiced.
- Every section has a committee in-charge to regularly review and update the e-learning content to be in line with the CBSE curriculum and changes notified by the CBSE board.
- Students are facilitated with e-learning user ID and password to access from home to take up worksheets. It is an additional support extended to develop the habit of reference to improve the subject knowledge.

11. Reporting Progress & Monitoring Learning

- Parent-Teacher meetings are conducted regularly to discuss the academic performance of their wards.
- Parents shall meet the teacher concerned with prior appointment during the recess.
- Teachers also communicate the students' learning difficulties to the parents through school diary.
- Student performance record is maintained in a prescribed format.

12. Differentiation & Special Needs

- Teachers ensures teaching instruction and notes meets heterogeneous group of learners.
- Extra coaching is given for low achievers after class hours. Similarly, bright coaching classes are conducted for high achievers.
- Lesson activities, revision tests are conducted to ensure students are prepared to meet their individual needs.
- Catch-up classes concept (zero period) for classes I to IX has been introduced for students who joined in the second term and as well as the existing low achievers to cover the portions completed in the first term. Other students were promoted to focus on revision and independent study under the supervision of a teacher. For students of classes X to XII extra coaching was given.
- Equal importance is given to all students.
- Teaching involves variety of approaches that is, use of self, modern teaching methods including e-learning content, group learning, buddy system, educational games, quiz, club activity, worksheets/assignments to integrate and consolidate the concept and to make learning an enjoyable experience.

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• We have the <u>Department of Guidance and Counselling</u> in our school which includes a Special Educator and Counsellors. Guidance and counselling has become an integral part of our school's academic programme. It cultivates in students the right kind of attitude towards life. The department aims at training the students in self-discipline, confidence building and accepting criticism constructively and constantly. It further enables the students to resolve conflicts logically, rationally and not emotionally. Students in higher secondary classes can keep themselves abreast of all career opportunities available both in India and abroad from the school's G & C centre.

Special Education

Special education service is provided in the school for children who require additional support in learning due to Specific Learning Disorders.

Students who have specific difficulty in acquiring and use of learning skills such as reading, writing, spelling and arithmetic can be referred to Special Educator for an assessment and further support.

13. Human & Social Development

- Moral Science and Life skill classes focus of the social behaviours of the students and promotes them to be responsible towards society. Some of the social contributions the student has done are:

14. The School Behaviour Policy

Purpose:

The purpose of the policy aims to provide a moral framework for students' personal development so that they can become courteous and tolerant members of the society. Also, to encourage self-discipline and an awareness about the positive contribution that the individual can make to his/her life, to the school and to the society at large.

Aims of Policy

- To make the school's expectations of behaviour clear to all students.
- To inculcate caring, considerate and co-operative behaviour among students and a proper regard for authority.

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- To encourage the development of self-discipline and a sense of responsibility for one's own actions.
- To make teaching and learning effective.
- To create an environment based upon mutual respect.

Key elements constituting the Student Behaviour Policy are as follows:

- The School's Vision and Mission statements and values it wants to see upheld.
- Rights, roles and responsibilities of each component of the school community for maintaining high behaviour standards.
- Rules, procedures and protocols setting boundaries and expectations.
- Rewards points for positive behaviour and negative marking for acts of indiscipline.
- Mechanisms for control, monitoring, follow-up and support.
- Guidance and counselling for behaviour problems.

Policy - Disciplinary Actions:

- Good code of conduct should be maintained by all the students throughout their schooling.
- School policy, rules and regulations should be followed as mentioned in the school diary and the practices prevailing in the school and the rule of the country.
- Discipline in-charges will monitor the student and school discipline on a regular basis.
- Following corrective measures shall be taken depending on the level of indiscipline displayed by the students:
- Immediate checking of misbehavior.
- Verbal reprimand.
- Repeated or extra work where work is of an unacceptable standard.
- Note to parents in the school diary.
- Parent teacher meeting.
- Referring to the student counsellor of the school, if required.
- Issue of a warning.
- Student can also be asked to leave the class if any act of indiscipline makes it exceptionally impossible to continue the lesson.
- Students may also be suspended for some time for any repeated act of indiscipline.
- School will also keep the option of rusticating habitual offenders with no scope for improvement in behaviour at the end of the academic year. Any, criminal offence shall be reported to the police for further action.

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Strategies for detention

Day 1- Day with counsellor where the counsellor will do the intervention.

Day 2- Day with class teacher where the student will stay with the teacher during PT period and recess.

Refer the child for additional support (external agencies).

Promote peer education by selecting and training students from each class to intervene or report the cases (Buddy Group).

<u>Re-entry Meeting</u>: A meeting will be held upon re-entry of the student after the suspension period is over with the Principal, Head of Section and Class Teacher Concerned in order to understand the attitude/behaviour change of the student. Class teacher will monitor the performance of the student for 2 weeks and submit a report with the student's progress in behaviour to the Principal through the Head of Section.

15. Health & Safety

- The campus is under surveillance and security staff deputed at different places in the campus monitor the in & out flow of students, staff and visitors.
- Exit pass is practiced for staff and students for approved exit during the school hours.

- The pupil's diary holds all the rules and regulation of the school ranging from general rules, uniform, fee, examination, activities of the school etc., On Special occasions like School Sports day, Annual day, Award ceremonies, parents are invited by sending invitation letters.
- Whenever the school gets an opportunity of receiving experts related to parental guidance or career guidance, parents are invited for a live class. Parents of specific group of student, who need special attention, are also directly called to the school and the necessary information and guidance is duly passed on.
- Parent-teacher meetings are conducted regularly once in a term and thrice in an academic year to discuss academic & other matters related to their wards and highlight the progress of students and his/ her overall development.
- School communicates academic performance of their ward through monthly updates as well as report cards issued after each terminal examination.
- Behavioral aspects are reported through pupil's diary, letter and over the phone.
- Open house sessions are also conducted for parents of board exam writing students.
- The school is in constant touch with Indian mission available in the country and exchange information. School has constant plans to support and encourage participation from community like sports associations, cultural associations, scouts and guides missions, environmental organizations and organization related to Arts, culture and literature.

SCHOOL ENCOURAGES AND FOSTERS COMMUNITY ACTIVITIES WITH STAKEHOLDERS.

- In order to develop a sense of social responsibility, philanthropic gesture, care and empathy among our students towards the needy ones, a visit to the cancer patients was made by our students' representatives and teacher representatives at the Cancer Recovery Unit of Hamad Medical City.
- School also encourages students to donate used clothes, toys, etc.
- School actively participates in the events organized in connection with National days and sports events including school Olympics. The school has won many prizes and medals.
- Our School organizes Sirat-un-Nabi elocution competitions and Qu'ran recitation competitions for all private schools in Qatar.
- Participation in events organized by other Indian schools, Independent Schools. Qatar Government, Ministry of Education & Higher Education and Indian Mission in Qatar.
- Our school has also contributed INR 1 million toward the Kerala Flood Relief Campaign. Such philanthropic gestures have also been done in the past and shall be done in the future as well.

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20. Implementation of the education program in time of Covid 19 and precautions taken to ensure health and safety of staff and students.

Imparting education during Covid 19:

1. Educational tools:

E-learning (DS Portal), Zoom App (during online classes), Parent Portal.

2. Regular timetable is in place for all classes which covers the planned syllabus applicable for different educational stages.

3. Strategies used to make teaching effective are:

- 1. Worksheets/assignments are uploaded on parent portal which will be corrected by the teachers. Also, answer keys are provided for assistance of students and parents.
- 2. Recorded audio clips/video clips are forwarded to the students to develop their vocabulary.
- 3. e-learning portal access from home:
 - a. Recorded videos/lesson summary/question bank/concept worksheets are available on e-learning portal.
 - b. E book (Macmillan series)
- 4. Qualified and trained teachers who are capable of handling students are appointed and they communicate regularly with the parents.
- 5. Parents are Informed about the Students' Attendance /Performance.
- 6. Parents are informed about the students' performance by uploading report cards on parent portal, e-mails /phone calls by teachers.
- 7. Daily study plan provided.
- 8. Weekly /monthly syllabus given.
- 9. Chapter wise notes are also uploaded on the parents' portal.
- 10. Activity based learning is incorporated for lower classes to reduce stress on children.

4. Assessment of students:

- 1. Term wise exams are conducted as per schedule and parents are given advance notice about the same.
- 2. Tests are conducted after completion of every chapter.
- 3. Sufficient revision is given to students to obtain effective learning results.
- 4. Special classes are given for weak students.

5. Assistance extended to parents:

- 1. Parents can contact through emails, WhatsApp, over phone (extension numbers shared in circulars) during the school working hours.
- 2. Feedback is collected from the Students as well as from the parents.
- 3. Parent teacher meetings.
- 4. Guidance and counselling session are given as required in the school or parents can opt for tele counselling as per their convenience.
- 5. Mental wellbeing awareness programme conducted in coordination with Hamad Medical Cooperation for parents and students.

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6. Extra-curricular activities:

- 1. Many inter-school and intra-school competitions were organized in various activities under different categories.
 - Some of the important competition were:
 - a. Panel discussion by Junior, middle and senior students on important topics related to Covid 19.
 - b. Versified expression (poetry recitation competition).
 - c. Arabic speech & Quran recitation.
 - d. Diaspora pencil drawing competition.
 - e. Timeless tales -story telling competition.
 - f. Quiz mania
 - g. Debate
 - h. Collage making
 - i. Celebration of important days.
- 2. Many important events such as investiture Ceremony, Principal's Honour List (award for academic excellence), etc. were conducted.
- 3. Socially responsible: Senior students of our school volunteered and supported the donation campaign of Qatar Cancer Society.

7. <u>Trainings & development</u>:

- 1. Covid -19 awareness programme was given by a Doctor from Hamad Medical Cooperation in order to education the staff about preventive measures.
- 2. About 75 trainings in various subjects were conducted for teachings staff to support them meet the challenges of blended/online education and to ensure effective teaching and learning results.
- 3. Other staff were trained and educated about preventive measures and safety of students.

8. <u>Safety & precautionary measures used</u>:

- 1. Hand Sanitizer dispensers are installed in the classrooms, labs, corridors, staff rooms, waiting areas, reception area, etc.
- 2. Staff and students wear mask in the campus.
- 3. A health monitoring team is created and contact numbers of focal points are given to parents.
- 4. Isolation rooms are available in every section.
- 5. Campus is thoroughly cleaned immediately after students are evacuated.
- 6. Classrooms follow all Covid rules and social distancing norms.
- 7. Precautionary measures are displayed in the campus, washrooms, corridors, etc.
- 8. Videos on personal hygiene and precautionary measures are shared with students & parents.
- 9. Necessary guidelines about the welfare of students includes suggestion for a healthy meal for students are shared with parents on parent portal.
- 10. Students are restricted from sharing their food and water bottle with their friends.
- 11. Staff are deputed on duty to ensure disbursement of students is with social distancing.

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
