Article 2: Organizational Structure

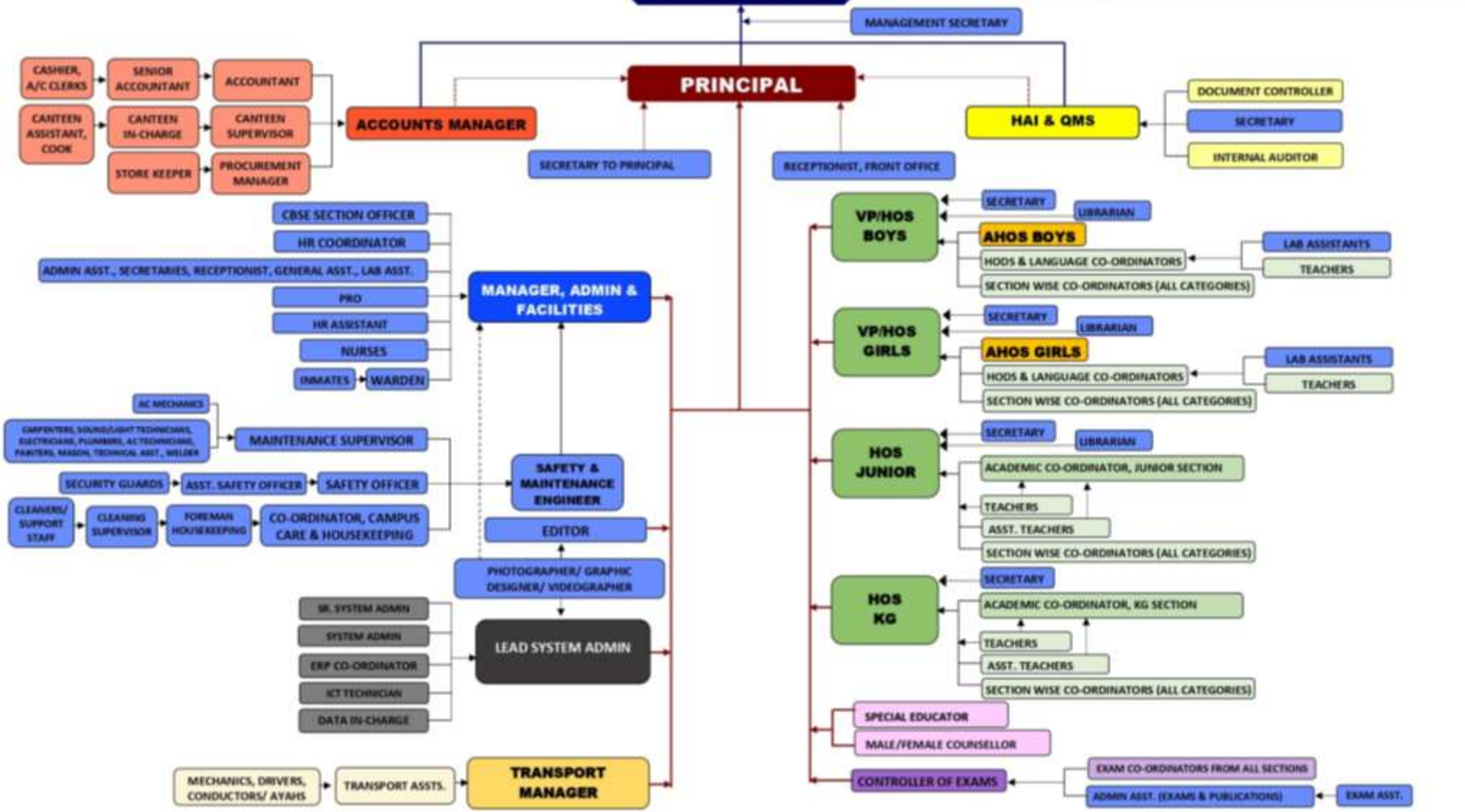
- The number of staff in the structure is proportional to the number of students, the academic level, and the number of classes.

Article 6: Curricular and Extracurricular Activities

- Co-curricular activities such as games, sports, music (classical/vocal/instrumental), dance, orchestra, gymnastics, dramatics, debate, public speaking, photography etc., are promoted. Individual and group competitions in these are conducted to bring about all-round development of the pupil. Special coaching classes are conducted for athletics and various games like Basketball, Football, Table Tennis, Volleyball, Cricket, Shuttle Badminton, Tennis, Throw ball, Taekwondo and Karate.
- Mass P.T. exercises are carried out on Thursdays.
- Students are annually taken out on picnics and educational tours. Teachers make adequate arrangements for such outings and supervise the conduct of the students. However, the Management of the school is not responsible for any unforeseen incidents like accidents or sickness during or after picnic, tours etc.
- **Houses:** Students of classes I to XII have been divided into four houses - Red, Blue, Green and Yellow. Co-curricular activities are conducted house wise to develop a healthy spirit of competition among the students.
- Participation in curricular and co-curricular activities helps the pupil in building up his/her personality. It provides a sense of responsibility and capacity for leadership. It inculcates a sense of discipline in him/her. With this aim in view, Head Boy/Girl, House Captains/ Literary Association Secretaries, Student Editors, Prefects and Students Council members are elected to develop leadership qualities.
- Extra classes will be arranged for slow learners after class hours. Those from classes IX to XII, who are listed as slow learners, shall compulsorily attend these classes. Special class will be arranged for the students of classes IX to XII during holidays/winter vacation. Attendance of all students is compulsory in such classes.
- Intensive coaching classes will be arranged for the bright students. Students of classes IX to XII will not be granted leave except in emergency cases for more than one week. Students, who are found absent for more than a week without written permission from the Principal/Head of Section, may not be permitted to attend classes.

Result Analysis:

- Grade wise result analysis is conducted term wise and annually to develop lesson plans and other learning resources that will enhance the learning outcomes.
- Additional support is provided to low achievers.
- Children who need additional support from the student's counsellor or the special educator to improve their academics are handled confidentially along with the support of parents. The special educator gives all support and guidance to parents in helping the child in the best possible way.
- Assessment structure is as per CBSE norms, and all promotion guidance issued by CBSE and MoEHE are followed.

Equivalency: Necessary support is extended to parents to obtain equivalency certificate from MoEHE.

Article 11: School reports to monitor learning and report progress

- Parent-Teacher meetings are conducted regularly to discuss the academic performance of their wards.
- Parents shall meet the teacher concerned with prior appointment during the recess.
- Teachers also communicate the students' learning difficulties to the parents through school diary.
- Student performance record is maintained in a prescribed format.
- A Senior School Certificate Examination will be issued by CBSE, India to students who successfully complete grade XII.

Article 12: Students with disabilities and learning difficulties (For schools that provide this service)

- The school has few students with learning difficulties. Identified students are supported by the student counsellors to obtain better learning results.
- Teachers ensures teaching instruction and notes meets heterogeneous group of learners.
- Extra coaching is given for low achievers after class hours. Similarly, bright coaching classes are conducted for high achievers.
- Lesson activities, revision tests are conducted to ensure students are prepared to meet their individual needs.
- Catch-up classes concept (zero period) for classes I to IX has been introduced for students who joined in the second term and as well as the existing low achievers to cover the portions completed in the first term. Other students were promoted to focus on revision and independent study under the supervision of a teacher. For students of classes X to XII extra coaching was given.
- Equal importance is given to all students.

Students in higher secondary classes can keep themselves abreast of all career opportunities available both in India and abroad from the school's G & C centre.

Special Education

- Special education service is provided in the school for children who require additional support in learning due to Specific Learning Disorders.
- Students who have specific difficulty in acquiring and use of learning skills such as reading, writing, spelling and arithmetic can be referred to Special Educator for an assessment and further support.
- For Islamic students – Islamic education is provided and for non-Islamic students : Moral Science classes are conducted. Life skill classes focus on the social behaviours of the students and promotes them to be responsible towards society.
- Educational tours for students to support their social and emotional well-being.
- Psychology is one of the optional subjects for grade 11 and 12 students to provide career opportunities for interested students.
- Staff picnics, fun day and cultural programmes are conducted for staff to support their social and emotional well-being.

Some of the social contributions that the students have done are:

- Donations of used clothes.
 - Iftar for needy
 - Visiting palliative units.
 - Donating goodies to sick people.
 - Cleaning beach
 - Assisting in the diabetes awareness campaign.
 - Acknowledging the supporting staff on labour day with some gifts or money, etc.
 - Green campaign - planting samplings in the school campus and kitchen garden in every section of the school.
 - School supports and promotes all donation campaigns raised by the Qatar Red Crescent and Qatar Charity.
 - Necessary approvals are obtained from Ministry of Education and Higher Education and Qatar Charity to organize donation campaigns in the schools.
- The scouts, guides, cubs and bulbul also actively participate in many environmental and social activities within the school and on field trips.
 - The scouts master and guide leader attend trainings, camps and workshops organized by the Qatar Scouts and Guides Association and The Bharat Scouts and Guides, etc.

Article 14: School Behavior

Purpose:

The purpose of the policy aims to provide a moral framework for students' personal development so that they can become courteous and tolerant members of the society. Also, to encourage self-discipline and an awareness about the positive contribution that the individual can make to his/her life, to the school and to the society at large.

Aims of Policy

- To make the school's expectations of behaviour clear to all students.
- To inculcate caring, considerate and co-operative behaviour among students and a proper regard for authority.
- To encourage the development of self-discipline and a sense of responsibility for one's own actions.
- To make teaching and learning effective.
- To create an environment based upon mutual respect.

Key elements constituting the Student Behaviour Policy are as follows:

- The School's Vision and Mission statements and values it wants to see upheld.
- Rights, roles and responsibilities of each component of the school community for maintaining high behaviour standards.
- Rules, procedures and protocols setting boundaries and expectations.
- Rewards points for positive behaviour and negative marking for acts of indiscipline.
- Mechanisms for control, monitoring, follow-up and support.

- Guidance and counselling for behaviour problems.

Policy - Disciplinary Actions:

- Good code of conduct should be maintained by all the students throughout their schooling.
- School policy, rules and regulations should be followed as mentioned in the school diary and the practices prevailing in the school and the rule of the country.
- Discipline in-charges will monitor the student and school discipline on a regular basis.
- Following corrective measures shall be taken depending on the level of indiscipline displayed by the students:
 - Immediate checking of misbehavior.
 - Verbal reprimand.
 - Repeated or extra work where work is of an unacceptable standard.
 - Note to parents in the school diary.
 - Parent teacher meeting.
 - Referring to the student counsellor of the school, if required.
 - Issue of a warning.
 - Student can also be asked to leave the class if any act of indiscipline makes it exceptionally impossible to continue the lesson.
 - Students may also be suspended for some time for any repeated act of indiscipline.
 - School will also keep the option of rustivating habitual offenders with no scope for improvement in behaviour at the end of the academic year. Any, criminal offence shall be reported to the police for further action.

DISCIPLINE PLAN/BEHAVIOUR INTERVENTION

It is important to have a behaviour intervention plan for the school in order to maintain and encourage appropriate behaviour.

Strategies for detention

Day 1- Day with counsellor where the counsellor will do the intervention.

Day 2- Day with class teacher where the student will stay with the teacher during PT period and recess.

Refer the child for additional support (external agencies).

Promote peer education by selecting and training students from each class to intervene or report the cases (Buddy Group).

Re-entry Meeting: A meeting will be held upon re-entry of the student after the suspension period is over with the Principal, Head of Section and Class Teacher Concerned in order to understand the attitude/behaviour change of the student. Class teacher will monitor the performance of the student for 2 weeks and submit a report with the student's progress in behaviour to the Principal through the Head of Section.

Article 15: Health, Safety and Security

- Standard Operating Procedures for Science Labs (Bio, Chem, Phy, Home Science) are displayed in all laboratories.
- Computer lab procedure and instructions for safe use of computers and related applications are displayed in all computer laboratories.
- The campus is under surveillance and security staff deputed at different places in the campus monitor the in & out flow of students, staff and visitors.
- Exit pass is practiced for staff and students for approved exit during the school hours.
- Stay back pass is also available for monitoring the students stay after the school hours.
- Well quipped clinic with qualified Nurses are available in the campus.
- As part of safety procedure safety walk (preventive safety measures), safety sampling (a specific area is studied in detail by Safety Office), safety tour (a detailed evaluation of safety performance by the facilities team and by higher authorities), fire monitoring and mock drills (to ensure proper evacuation procedure) are practiced in the school to ensure hazard free campus.
- The school infrastructure is monitored regularly.
- The firefighting system are as per the guidance line of the Ministry of Civil Defense, State of Qatar.
- School's Emergency Rescue Team is available.
- Safety and security staff are updated regarding all safety procedures, policies and work instructions.
- Traffic near the school gates are monitored during the school opening and closing hours.
- All the exit points are Highlight.
- Emergency numbers are displayed all on the school notice boards, reception and common points which are visible.
- Gate pass in maintained for inflow and out flow of vehicle and substances.
- Personal hygiene is promoted among students. Awareness sessions are conducted by the welfare teams.
- There is a well-established personal hygiene policy.
- The welfare clinic takes care of the health and hygiene of students.

- Instruction regarding personal hygiene of students is detailed in the school diary under general guidelines. There are proforma in the school diary to mark the tardiness of the students.
- A dedicated team of housekeeping staff ensures overall cleanliness of washrooms, classrooms and other areas in the entire campus.

Students Safety Policy

Purpose:

The purpose of the policy aims to provide safe and congenial environment for the students.

Aims of Policy

- To ensure safety and security of the students.
- To provide medical first aid, if any injury caused and arranging for medical support for major injuries/accident during the school hours.

Key elements constituting the Students Safety Policy are as follows:

- The School's Vision and Mission statements
- Rules of the Ministry of Education and Ministry of Civil Defense, State of Qatar

Policies:

General Safety:

- The school campus should be free of hazardous elements/equipment.
- The school infrastructure should be monitored regularly.
- Depute security staff at all gates/school entrances.
- Regular safety checks should be conducted by the security team to ensure the school safety.

- All the exits will always be kept clear and will be highlighted with illuminated sign boards.
- The school shall be equipped with Fire Alarm & Fire Fighting System and the same shall be tested and maintained as the guidelines of QCDD.
- School shall Insure the students in the public liability insurance also during the transit in the school buses.
- Regular safety checks should be conducted by the security team to ensure the school safety.
- Visitors register will be maintained with all details of the visitors.
- Maintain gate pass for inflow and out flow of vehicle and substances.
- Students will be only allowed to leave the gate with their guardian and a proper Gate Pass during the school hours.

Emergencies/Accident & Incidents:

- School shall implement & monitor an effective Emergency action plan.
- School Shall maintain an Emergency response team.
- School shall conduct Mock drills to evaluate, exercise the effectiveness of its plans, procedures and train the students and staff.
- All the emergency contact numbers shall be communicated to the students through notice boards and other evacuation sign boards installed in the hallways and corridors.
- Any Accident or Incidents will be reported as per the school procedure and the school authorities shall investigate these to identify & eliminate the root causes so as to prevent re-occurrences.

Transportation Safety:

- School shall be responsible to provide a safe transport to all students availing of the facility.
- Attendance shall be properly monitored on the bus by the conductor.
- Students below the age of 11 shall only be dropped at the doorstep to a custody.

- The students will be only picked up and dropped at their designated stop.
- Vehicles shall be periodically maintained to ensure safety.
- All drivers and conductors will be properly trained.
- Upon completing each trip, the conductor, driver and the security shall ensure no students are left behind.
- Disciplinary action will be taken against Students misbehavior in the bus.
- The Bus Safety rules shall be posted in the bus and communicated to the Students.
- Five level security heck list.

Field Trips/Educational Tour:

- Field trip/ educational tour shall only be conducted with prior approval from the relevant authorities.
- Students are only permitted to join the trip with written consent from the parent.
- The students shall be accompanied by teachers in a ratio of 10:1.
- Students shall only leave for such trip from the school and shall report back to school for security verification.
- An itinerary of the trip shall be prepared and sent to the parents.

Students Dispersal Policy

Purpose:

The purpose of this policy is to ensure safety of all students as they enter or depart from the school campus.

Aims of Policy

- Manage movements in and out of students.
- Students' safety to and from classrooms in an orderly manner.
- No student is left behind.
- Board the students on the right bus.
- To promote parking area safety and stay incident free.

Policies:

Students availing school transport

- Students' boarding and deboarding logs shall be properly maintained by the bus conductor.
- The school bus stops within the boundary wall of the school.
- Once the morning drop-off has been done, bus will be checked by the driver, conductor, by teacher in-charge and security at gate to ensure that all students have deboarded and no student is left behind in the bus before the bus moves to the parking yard for final checking.
- At dispersal time, a designated conductor accompanies children of classes KG I to Grade 3 to the school bus in a group.
- Every bus has one conductor present on the route.
- In case a child who usually travels by bus is being picked up by the parent for some reason, this should be done only after due procedure of request from parent to the Class teacher through entry in dairy/email/letter which will be submitted to the Head of Section concerned for exit pass/permission slip. The transport section is intimated about the early leaving children for driver's record and attendance follow-up.

- This gate pass is required to be given at the gate when the parent / guardian leaves with the child.
- At dispersal time, after attendance is taken, if any child who was present in the morning is missing, the conductor/driver confirms with the respective section about the same. The section shall communicate such cases to the Transport Dept. and ensure the reason for absence.
- Zone leaders are assigned to supervise safe and smooth movement of students and buses.
- Care is taken that at no time should a student (especially a female) remain alone in the bus with the driver and male conductor whether at the start or at the end of a journey.
- Routing is planned accordingly so that the first and last child is not a female.
- Bus should be safely parked on the right side of the road at the drop point to ensure students safety.
- Bus routes are optimized so that students are dropped close to their residence as agreed by the parents.
- No student shall be dropped off at any other location unless otherwise the request has been approved by the transport department.
- When children, especially those in Class 5 and below get off at their drop off point, they are not left alone on the road but are handed over only to the parent/maid or authorized representative or as agreed upon.
- The bus driver ensures that the doors of the bus are closed before he resumes the route.
- Banksman is provided whenever there is lack of visibility particularly when the vehicle is reversed.
- School will attempt to drop the child off closest to the gate, and should this not be possible, parents must make arrangements to prevent them walking alone or ensure that they are adequately equipped to manage this confidently, with a good awareness of safety skills. It is the joint responsibility of school and parents to minimize risk to the student and equip them with the confidence to handle risks in an age-appropriate manner.
- In case the parent/representative has not reached to pick-up the student of Class 5 or below, under no circumstances should the student be left on the road. In the event there is another known parent in the same complex willing to take responsibility, this may be permitted as an exception after the teacher confirms this with the parent. If there is no one else to pick up the child, the child may not be permitted to alight, and the teacher on the bus will coordinate with the parent for getting off at the next convenient stop or he/she will be brought back to school and parent shall pick their child accordingly at the earliest.

NON - BUS GOING STUDENTS

- Students shall be dropped and picked at the designated gates which are timely intimated to the parents through circulars.
- Parents' students shall pick their child after 1.25 p.m.
- Early leavers should follow the procedure for early leave and an exit permission slip duly signed by the respective Head of Section should be submitted to the security at the gate.
- KG 1 to Grade 5 students should be picked by the parent.
- Students should oblige to the traffic rules followed near the school gates to avoid any incident/accident. The security on duty will assist the students in crossing the road as applicable.

- Fleet of Air-conditioned buses for convenient transportation for all areas of Doha including Al-Khor.
- Well - equipped laboratories.
- Prayer halls
- All classrooms are smart classrooms and well equipped with interactive boards and internet facilities. Necessary firewall restrictions are applied to avoid misuse of internet resources.

- Weekly /monthly syllabus given.
- Chapter wise notes are also uploaded on the parents' portal.

- School also encourages students to donate used clothes, toys, etc.
- School actively participates in the events organized in connection with National days and sports events including school Olympics. The school has won many prizes and medals.
- Our School organizes Sirat-un-Nabi elocution competitions and Qu'ran recitation competitions for all private schools in Qatar.
- Participation in events organized by other Indian schools, Independent Schools. Qatar Government, Ministry of Education & Higher Education and Indian Mission in Qatar.
- Our school has also contributed INR 1 million toward the Kerala Flood Relief Campaign. Such philanthropic gestures have also been done in the past and shall be done in the future as well.

Article 19: Distance Learning

DISTANCE LEARNING POLICY

1. Purpose:

This policy outlines the measures, technology resources, and strategies for implementing distance learning at MES Indian School. It aims to ensure that students have continued access to quality education even when health conditions prevent in-person attendance.

2. Aims of Policy:

- To ensure uninterrupted education in case of emergencies.
- To provide equal learning opportunities for all students, regardless of location, socio-economic background, or physical ability.

- To encourage the effective use of digital tools and platforms to enhance teaching and learning.

3. Policies:

3.1. Technology for Distance Learning

The school will provide appropriate technological tools and platforms for the effective delivery of distance learning.

3.1.1. Devices: The school will ensure that every student has access to a device (laptop, tablet, or other) sufficient to participate in online lessons.

3.1.2. Learning Platforms: The school will utilize secure and accessible online platforms (e.g., DS digital (MES e learning platform), Google Classroom, Zoom, Microsoft Teams) for course delivery, communication, and assessments.

3.1.3. Internet Access: In cases where students face connectivity issues, the school will work with families and assist in resolving technical issues.

3.1.4. Technical Support: The school will have a dedicated team available to troubleshoot and provide support for both students and educators in case of technical difficulties.

3.2. Providing Distance Learning

3.2.1. Lesson plans and teaching notes will be developed by the teachers and shall be made available on the e learning portal for easy access and implementation.

3.2.2. Students' activities and worksheets shall be uploaded on parent portal.

3.2.3. Teachers should monitor student progress and provide regular feedback. Additionally, counselors and support staff will be available for any emotional or academic support the student may need while learning remotely.

3.2.4. Distance learning assessments will be aligned with in-person expectations, ensuring that remote students receive fair and accurate evaluations based on their learning outcomes.

3.3. Communication and Collaboration

3.3.1. Regular Updates: The school will provide regular updates to parents/guardians and students on the status of distance learning, including any changes in policies, technology, or procedures.

3.3.2. Feedback Mechanisms: Students and parents will have opportunities to provide feedback on the effectiveness of distance learning. This feedback will be used to improve future delivery and support systems.

3.3.3. Teacher Training: Teachers will undergo regular professional development to enhance their skills in delivering high-quality distance learning. This includes training on digital tools, student engagement strategies, and best practices for online assessments.

Providing distance learning to students in the event of health conditions that prevent the student from attending school:

● **Educational tools:**

E-learning (DS Portal), Zoom App (during online classes), Parent Portal.

Chapter wise notes are also uploaded on the parents' portal.

● **Strategies used to make teaching effective are:**

- Worksheets/assignments are uploaded on parent portal which will be corrected by the teachers. Also, answer keys are provided for assistance of students and parents.
- Recorded audio clips/video clips are forwarded to the students to develop their vocabulary.
- e-learning portal access from home:
 - a. Recorded videos/lesson summary/question bank/concept worksheets are available on e-learning portal.
 - b. E book (Macmillan series)
- Parents are Informed about the Students' Performance.
- Counsellors shall be in touch with the students to support their emotional well-being.

Conclusion:
